

This report provides key demographic and economic data for Illinois Congressional District 7. It is made available by the Chicago Cook Workforce Partnership.¹

At A Glance

- The Congressional District's current **population** of 1,334,153 is expected to increase by 16,247 over the next ten years.
- By 2017, this Congressional District is projected to create 77,363 **new jobs** with positions in business and financial operations occupations and personal care and service occupations representing the largest numbers of new jobs.
- The Congressional District's **largest industry sector** of employment is government followed by the professional, scientific, and technical services industry.


Population

• The distribution of the Congressional District's population by age group reflects a younger population than the State's total population, with 54% of the population under 35 years as compared with the State's 48% under 35 years.

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¹ Data in this report has been compiled at the zip code level. In an effort not to skew district data, zip code areas representing less than 10,000 acres in the Congressional District have been excluded from the district's data. Exceptions include data for zip codes 60604, 60602, and 60301 which were included in Congressional District 7 and zip code 60537 which was included in both Congressional District 14 and 16 data.



Industry Sector Employment

Between 2007 and 2012

- The Congressional District lost 5,049 jobs during the past 5 years while the State lost 106,433 jobs overall.
- The industry sectors gaining the most jobs over the past 5 years were finance and insurance (19.074) and educational services (10,202).
- Industry sectors with the largest job loss between 2007 and 2012 were government (-12,052) and construction (-9,616).


Looking Forward to 2017

- Over the next five years the 7th Congressional District is expected to gain 77,363 jobs with jobs projected to grow at a higher rate than the State. The finance and insurance industry sector is projected to add the largest number of jobs (21,190) followed by professional, scientific, and technical services (15,837). Manufacturing is expected to have the greatest job loss (-6,636).
- Government is currently the largest industry sector, with 188,348 jobs and average earnings per worker, with benefits, of \$72,397. It is projected that government will remain the largest industry sector of employment through 2017.
- In Congressional District 7, the average earnings per worker, including benefits, is \$65,453, which is considerably higher than the State average of \$53,157.

Occupations

Between 2007 and 2012

- Over the past 5 years, business and financial operations occupations grew the most adding 14,032 jobs at a rate of 12%. The second largest growth was in personal care and service occupations which added 6,232 jobs at a rate of 13%.
- Office and administrative support occupations (-15,644) lost the most jobs during the 5 year period followed by construction and extraction occupations (-7,003) and production occupations (-5,267).
- The largest occupational group in the 7h Congressional District is office and administrative support occupations with 182,814 jobs followed by sales and related occupations with 157,731 jobs.



Looking Forward to 2017

- Over the next 5 years, business and financial operations occupations are expected to have the largest job growth, adding 14,032 jobs. Personal care and service occupations are expected to have the second largest gain with 6,232 additional jobs.
- Legal occupations earn the highest average hourly wage of \$55.53 followed by management occupations averaging \$42.19 per hour.
- The highest proportional growth is projected for personal care and service occupations with a 13% increase.
- The largest job loss is expected in office and administrative support occupations (-15,644) followed by construction and extraction occupations (-7,003) and production occupations (-5,267).






Occupations Poised for Growth in 2017



• In the top ten largest occupations, lawyers have the highest average hourly wage of \$66.33 followed by securities, commodities, and financial service sales agents at \$36.17 per hour.





 Personal financial advisors and securities, commodities, and financial services sales agents are expected to be the fastest growing occupations in the Congressional District.



Occupations Requiring Educational Attainment

- In the 7th Congressional District, the largest occupation requiring a postsecondary vocational award or higher is personal financial advisors.
- Seven of the largest occupations requiring an educational attainment beyond high school completion are also among the
 fastest growing occupations: personal financial advisors; securities, commodities, and financial services sales agents; real
 estate sales agents; registered nurses; lawyers; accountants and auditors; and management analysts.
