# Illinois Congressional District 6 Congressman Peter Roskam



This report provides key demographic and economic data for Illinois Congressional District 6. It is made available by the DuPage Workforce Board, McHenry County Workforce Investment Board, and Workforce Board of Northern Cook County.<sup>1</sup>

### At A Glance

- The Congressional District's current **population** of 1,065,217 is expected to remain stable over the next 10 years.
- Twelve **employers** in this Congressional District have 2,000 or more employees. These large employers represent eight different industry sectors.
- By 2016, this Congressional District is projected to create 43,813 **new jobs** with positions in business and financial operations, education/training/library, and healthcare practitioners and technical occupations representing the largest numbers of new jobs.
- The Congressional District's largest industry sector of employment is manufacturing followed by administrative/support/waste management/remediation services.
- Educational attainment in the 6<sup>th</sup> Congressional District overall is higher than the State's. Approximately 65.1% of residents have some college or higher and 38.3% have a bachelor's degree or higher, as compared to the State's rates of 59.2% and 30.8% respectively.


## Population




## **Educational Attainment**

- A considerably higher percentage of the Congressional District's population ages 25 and over have attained a bachelor's degree or higher (38.3%) than the State attainment rate (30.8%).
- The percent of individuals who have completed some postsecondary education is 65.1% as compared to the State's rate of 59.2%.

### **Industry Sector Employment**

#### Between 2006 and 2011

- The Congressional District lost 50,340 jobs during the past 5 years at a rate significantly higher than the State's rate.
- The industry sectors losing the most jobs over the past 5 years were construction (-19,122) and manufacturing (--16,969).
- Industry sectors with the highest job growth between 2006 and 2011 included healthcare and social assistance (10,738) and educational services (5,045).



#### Looking Forward to 2016

- Over the next five years the 6<sup>th</sup> Congressional District is expected to gain 43,813 jobs which will almost restore the total jobs to the pre-recession level.
- The manufacturing industry sector represents the most jobs with average earnings per worker, with benefits, of \$76,263. Unfortunately, this industry sector is also expected to lose the most jobs over the next ten years (-9,898).
- In Congressional District 6, the average earnings per worker, including benefits, is \$62,427 which is considerably higher than the State average of \$55,276.

### Occupations

#### Between 2006 and 2011


- Over the past 5 years, education, training, and library occupations grew the most, adding 2,866 jobs in the Congressional District. The second largest growth was in healthcare practitioners and technical occupations with 2,797 new jobs.
- Construction and extraction occupations lost 14,902 jobs and office and administrative support occupations decreased by 13,702 jobs.
- Legal occupations are the highest paying occupations in the Congressional District, with an average hourly wage of \$45.87. Management occupations earn the second highest average wage of \$42.38 per hour.
- The largest occupational group in the Congressional District is office and administrative support occupations with 138,963 jobs followed by sales and related occupations with 121,719 jobs.

#### Looking Forward to 2016

- Over the next 5 years, business and financial operations occupations are expected to have the largest net job growth, adding 5,995 jobs. Sales and related occupations is expected to have the second largest gain with 4,604 additional jobs.
- Production occupations are projected to have the largest job loss, with a reduction of 3,942 jobs.
- The highest proportional growth is projected for healthcare support occupations with a 15% increase, followed by personal care and service occupations with a 12% increase.



#### **Occupations Poised for Growth in 2016**

 Retail salespersons and laborers and freight, stock, and material movers are the two largest occupations in the Congressional District.

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
In the top ten largest occupations, managers have the highest hourly earnings of \$36.36 per hour.

#### **Occupations Requiring Educational Attainment**

- In the 6<sup>th</sup> Congressional District the largest occupation requiring a post secondary vocational award or higher is business operation specialists.
- Three of the top ten occupations requiring an educational attainment beyond high school completion are also among the fastest growing occupations: registered nurses, real estate sale agents, and personal financial advisors.
