

This report provides key demographic and economic data for Illinois Congressional District 5. It is made available by the Chicago Cook Workforce Partnership and DuPage Workforce Board.¹

At A Glance

- The Congressional District’s current **population** of 1,337,709 is expected to increase by 19,744 over the next ten years.
- By 2017, this Congressional District is projected to create 40,960 **new jobs** with positions in personal care and service occupations and food preparation and serving related occupations representing the largest numbers of new jobs.
- The Congressional District’s **largest industry sector** of employment is healthcare and social assistance followed by retail.

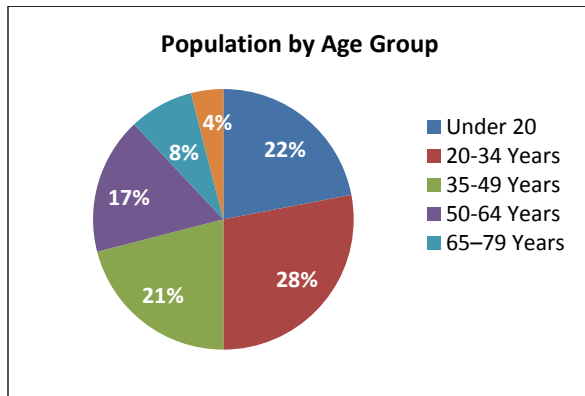
Population

- The Congressional District’s current population of 1,337,709 is expected to increase at a slower rate than the State over the next ten years.

- The distribution of the Congressional District’s population by age group is similar to the State with the exception of two groups. The proportion of persons under 20 years is much lower than the State and the 20 to 34 years group is much higher as a proportion of the District’s total population.

¹ Data in this report has been compiled at the zip code level. In an effort not to skew district data, zip code areas representing less than 10,000 acres in the Congressional District have been excluded from the district’s data. Exceptions include data for zip codes 60604, 60602, and 60301 which were included in Congressional District 7 and zip code 60537 which was included in both Congressional District 14 and 16 data.

Industry Sector Employment

Between 2007 and 2012

- The Congressional District lost 18,804 jobs during the past 5 years while the State lost 106,433 jobs overall.
- The industry sectors gaining the most jobs over the past 5 years were healthcare and social assistance (8,651) and educational services (6,228).
- Industry sectors with the largest job loss between 2007 and 2012 were construction (-14,477) and manufacturing (-9,844).

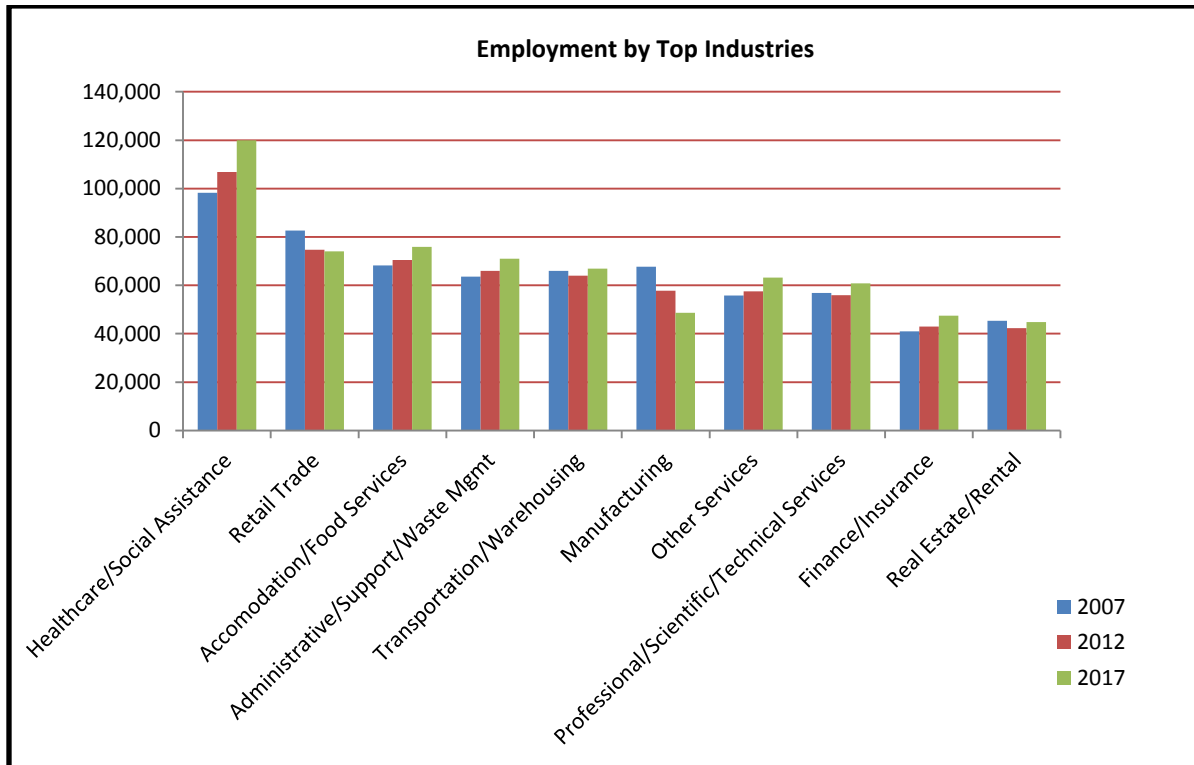

Looking Forward to 2017

- Over the next five years the 5th Congressional District is expected to gain 40,970 jobs with jobs projected to grow at a slightly slower rate than the State. The healthcare and social assistance industry sector is projected to add the largest number of jobs (13,016) followed by other services (5,699). Manufacturing is expected to have the greatest job loss (-9,110).
- Healthcare and social assistance is currently the largest industry sector, with 106,873 jobs and average earnings per worker, with benefits, of \$51,471. It is projected that healthcare and social assistance will continue to be the largest industry sector of employment through 2017.
- In Congressional District 5, the average earnings per worker, including benefits, is \$53,524, which is slightly higher than the State average of \$53,157.

Occupations

Between 2007 and 2012

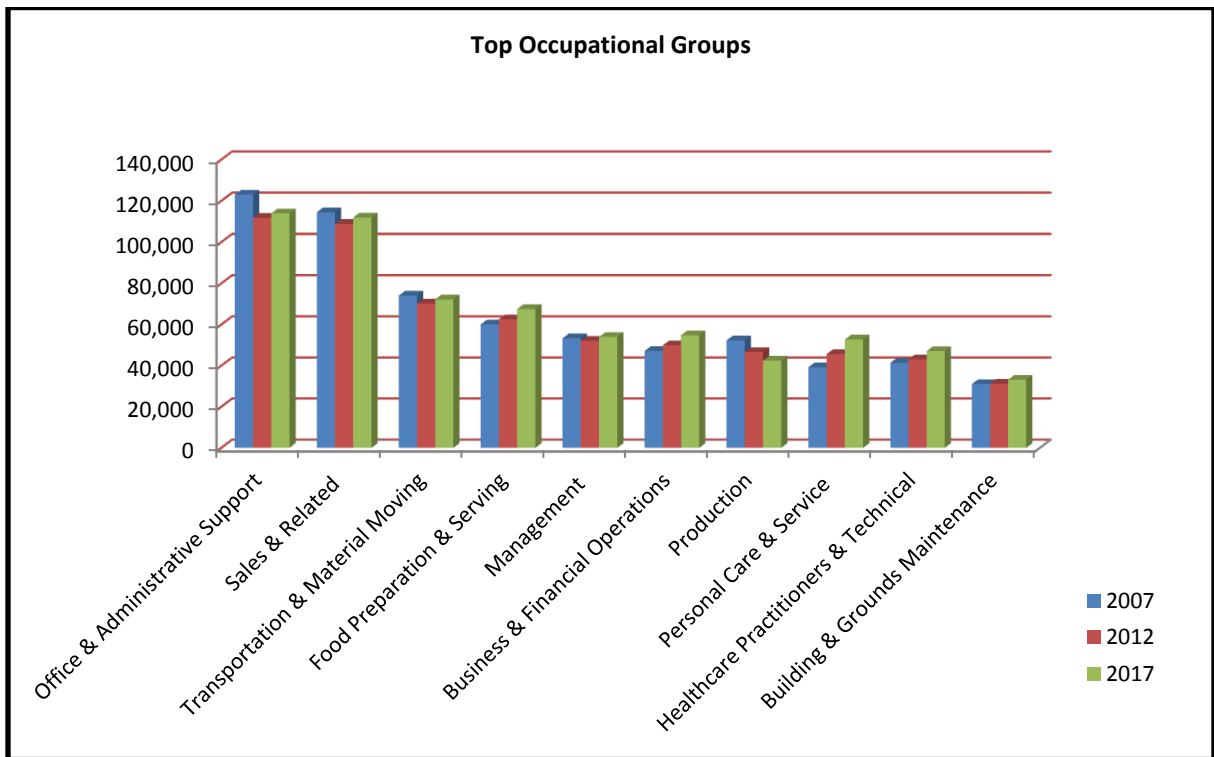
- Over the past 5 years, personal care and service occupations grew the most adding 6,381 jobs at a rate of 16%. The second largest growth was in education, training, and library occupations which added 3,658 jobs at a rate of 14%.
- Office and administrative support occupations (-11,271) lost the most jobs during the 5 year period followed by construction and extraction occupations (-10,107) and production occupations (-5,714).
- The largest occupational group in the 5h Congressional District is office and administration support occupations with 111,794 jobs followed by sales and related occupations with 108,874 jobs.

Looking Forward to 2017

- Over the next 5 years, personal care and service occupations are expected to have the largest job growth, adding 7,144 jobs. Food preparation and serving related occupations are expected to have the second largest gain with 5,009 additional jobs.
- Legal occupations earn the highest average hourly wage of \$51.15 followed by management occupations averaging \$41.87 per hour.
- The highest proportional growth is projected for personal care and service occupations with a 16% increase.
- The largest job loss is expected in production occupations (-4,152) followed by construction and extraction occupations (-848) and architecture and engineering occupations (-199).



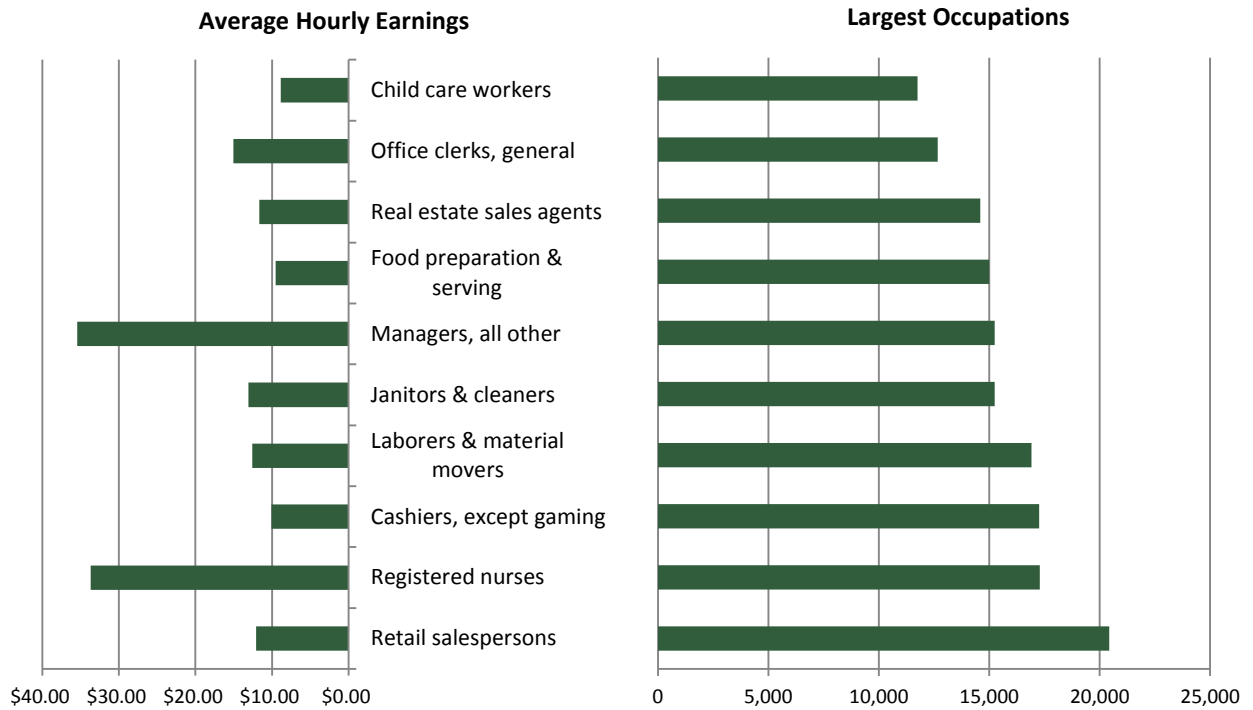
Occupations Poised for Growth in 2017

- Retail salesperson and real estate sales agents are the two largest occupations in the Congressional District.

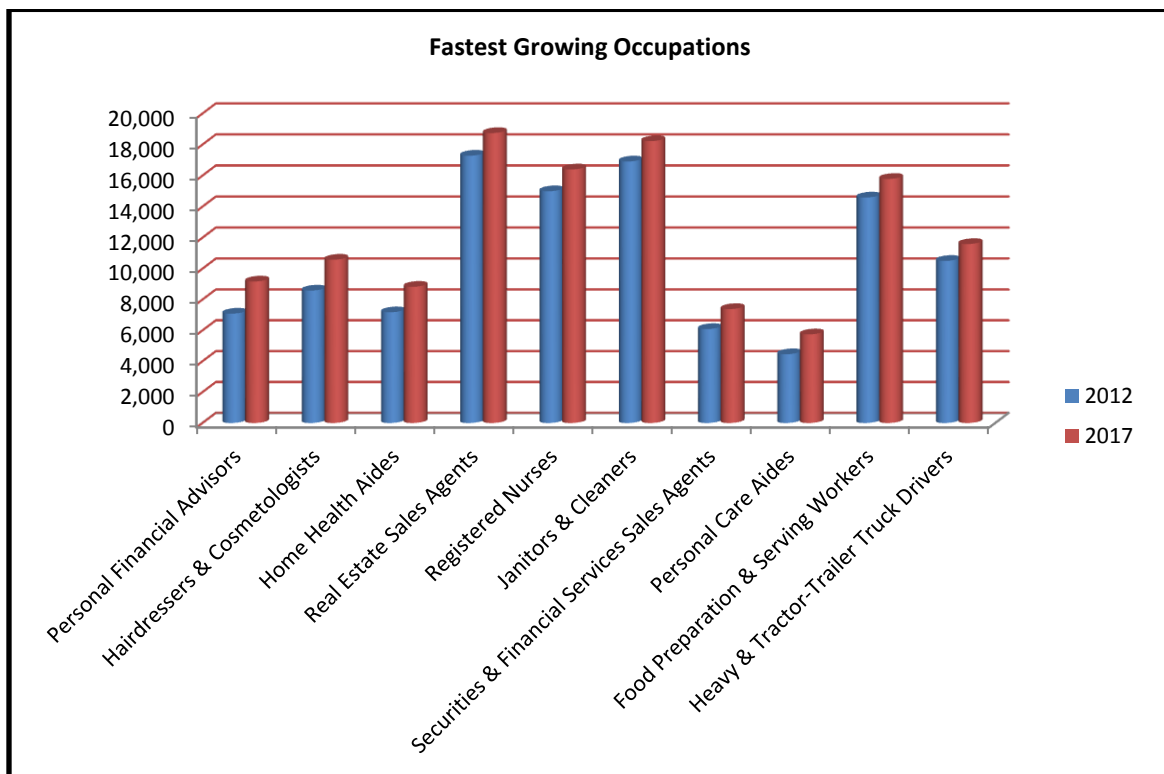

- In the top ten largest occupations, registered nurses have the highest average hourly wage of \$34.42 followed by real estate sales agents at \$19.50 per hour.



- Personal financial advisors and hairdressers, hairstylists, and cosmetologists are expected to be the fastest growing occupations in the Congressional District.



Occupations Requiring Educational Attainment

- In the 5th Congressional District, the largest occupation requiring a postsecondary vocational award or higher is real estate sales agents.
- Five of the largest occupations requiring an educational attainment beyond high school completion are also among the fastest growing occupations: real estate sales agents; registered nurses; hairdressers, hairstylists, and cosmetologists; personal financial advisors; and securities, commodities, and financial service sales agents.
